## Frogs Hopping Through The Cold



As we all know, this winter was one of the coldest Demarest has ever been through. There was a huge amount of snow on the ground that never went away, and we had more snow days then ever. Surviving the winter was difficult enough for us humans, but the tiny wood frog had to overcome an even colder winter in Alaska.

Most animals survive the winter by hibernating, or sleeping through the winter in a nice habitat. Frogs are amphibians, so they do not hibernate. 


